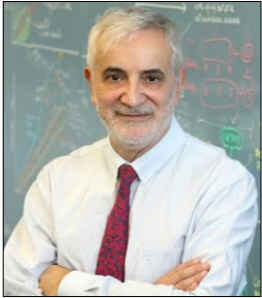

Luigi Ferrucci

Scientific Director of the U.S. National Institute on Aging

► Dr Ferrucci is a geriatrician and an epidemiologist who conducts research on the causal pathways leading to progressive physical and cognitive decline in older persons. He is currently the Scientific Director of the U.S. National Institute on Aging, since May 2011. He is one of [the keynote speakers](#) at the conference.



Merril Silverstein

Marjorie Cantor Endowed Professor of Aging Studies, Aging Studies Institute, Syracuse University, USA

► Merrill Silverstein is the inaugural holder of the Marjorie Cantor Endowed Professorship in Aging Studies, a joint appointment between Falk College and the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs. In over 150 research publications, he has focused on aging in the context of family life, with an emphasis on life course and international perspectives. Professor Silverstein plays a role in advancing collaborative research and teaching in the field of aging through Syracuse University's interdisciplinary [Aging Studies Institute](#).



Nancy Pedersen

Professor of genetic epidemiology at Karolinska Institutet, Sweden

► Professor Nancy Pedersen has worked with understanding how genes, environments and their interactions influence how we age as well as susceptibility to age related diseases. Her work has predominantly been based on several longitudinal studies of twins, the earliest starting in 1984.
